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Development and Fundraising

Our Adath community was once again very generous this past year. We continued to evolve over the year figuring out how to navigate the COVID-19 pandemic and find ways to connect our congregants in whatever way possible.

The annual L'Chaim campaign raised in excess of our \$250,000 goal, which is truly remarkable. We were all looking forward to a wonderful Annual Benefit honoring the Orbuch family and featuring a concert by Neshama Carlebach. Unfortunately, due to weather and flight cancellations, she wasn't able to make it here and we decided to cancel the event. Although it would have been an opportunity to finally bring everyone back together in-person at Adath, the anticipated event raised over \$110,000 in support of Youth Engagement. We are hoping to celebrate with Neshama and experience her music sometime in the future. The love and respect so many showed to the Orbuch family leading up to the event and in the days afterward was very much appreciated! To all of our benefit sponsors and supporters... THANK YOU!!

The following are some additional development and fundraising highlights from the past year:

- The Youth Department organized the annual Purim carnival, which was held outdoors in the Adath parking lot, showing creativity and flexibility.
- Adath members continued directing special gifts toward scholarships, Gan Shelanu Preschool, USY, TAMID, Adath Chesed Shel Emes Cemetery, the Center for Learning and Spirituality, clergy Discretionary Funds, Yad Sima Tova, and other specialty areas.
- Our many volunteers assisted with the L'Chaim Campaign, the Annual Benefit planning committees, the Purim Carnival, and all of the yearly programming.
- We hired a Development Director for the Adath Jeshurun Foundation to focus on the maintenance and growth of our many expanding Foundation Funds.

The ongoing generosity of our congregation is never taken for granted and is greatly appreciated! However you support our Adath community, whether it be by donating your money or your time, we couldn't do it without you.

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Finance

The purpose of the Finance Committee is to provide oversight and governance regarding the financial standing of our synagogue. We do this by providing guidance and communication to the organization's leadership to assist them in operating in a fiscally responsible manner.

Throughout the year, monthly financial statements along with updated forecasts for the remainder of the year are issued to staff, Executive Committee and members of the Board of Trustees. That information is used to assess the financial performance of the various programs on a current basis so that appropriate and timely decisions can be made if/when needed.

The Finance Committee meets several times a year to discuss the financial statements and other financial matters and meets several times in the early spring to work on the annual budget. This process starts with the Finance Committee communicating financial expectations for the upcoming year with the various department leaders. The department leaders then prepare budgets for their areas for the next fiscal year based on what they know and what they expect. After this is done, the individual departmental budgets are combined into one overall operating budget, after which the Finance Committee works to bring the overall budget into balance, typically working with our executive director, finance director, clergy and various department leaders, as necessary, to revise the proposed revenues and expenses.

The COVID–19 pandemic has made the last year fiscal year, ending May 31, 2022, extremely challenging, but with the help of our dedicated staff we were able to navigate the challenges and come out ahead. In May the Board approved an approximately \$4.4 million balanced operating budget. The 2022 budget reflects our current understanding guided by our COVID-19 committee but could change based on the economic and operating outlook in Minnesota. The budget reflects the continued support we receive from our Foundation. We continue to monitor expenses closely and make changes as needed.

As we continue to navigate the issues brought about by the pandemic to our operating income, we owe a huge debt of gratitude to our new Finance Director, Lori Banker, and our Executive Director Miranda Weisbuch. Lori joined us in March with an extensive background working in non-profit finance roles. Her dedication and support along with Miranda allow us to have accurate, reliable, and important financial information to ensure the synagogue continues to operate successfully. I would also like to thank our incredibly devoted and talented synagogue staff who, despite today's operational challenges, are able to provide high quality services and programming to our community.

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The Center for Learning & Spirituality

Adult Learning & Engagement, Congregational Life and the Library

Adath Jeshurun Congregation's preschool, Gan Shelanu, offers the synagogue's youngest congregants their first sweet taste of Jewish education. The Gan's comprehensive curriculum opens opportunities for students in a wide range of areas so they will achieve cognitive, social, emotional and physical development milestones that will provide a strong foundation for their further education.

Last summer, Camp Mishpacha was back open for business. We welcomed back many families who spent the school year at home due to the pandemic. It was exciting to see more smiling faces around the flagpole each morning, We spent a lot of time outside enjoying waterplay, having snack and lunch outside at the picnic tables and playing on the playground. We welcomed Ross Fishman as our music specialist, did yoga with Kelsey Bailey, one of our assistant teachers and celebrated Shabbat outside with Hazzan Dulkin. We continued our relationship with Farmer Joan for an abbreviated gardening season and welcomed special guests for our annual Fourth of July parade complete with "special fireworks."

Our school year began in September. Class sizes were able to expand, and we used pods to limit our contact with each other inside. Each pod had two classes and pods were able to interact both inside and outside together. Staff and (most) students wore masks inside the building. We were able to gather for Gan Shabbat in the sanctuary with Hazzan Dulkin. Although there has been a learning curve, our teachers embrace communicating with parents quickly and efficiently. Parents love being able to register with ease and receiving timely communication.

Each Friday morning before Gan Shabbat we had a parent shmooze followed by a parent discussion group with Hazzan Dulkin. Topics ranged from parenting in the pandemic to creating meaningful traditions in our families. Thank you to VP – Primary Ed, Andrea Potashnick for helping Hazzan with the inception of this program.

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

Young Adult Programming

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Primary Education

The Primary Education Committee oversees our congregation's educational, social and spiritual programming for children from birth to 4th grade and their families. This constituency of young families at Adath is known as *HaLev*: Families Growing Together. *HaLev* operates through the dedication of clergy, lay leaders and staff.

HaLev Programming

HaLev families also enjoy opportunities to celebrate Jewish holidays throughout the year including: *HaLev Tashlich* during Rosh Hashanah; *Pizza in the Hut* for Sukkot; *Simchat Torah Walk Thru*; congregants met under the synagogue tents for the annual *Blessing of the Animals* the week of Parshat *Noah*; *Dreidle Wonderland Hanukkah Havdalah* and *Hanukkah Candle Lighting Videos* featuring Adath families lighting candles each night of Hanukkah; *Mini Megillah Celebration* for Purim; *Matzah Brei Dinner and Bingo* during Passover; and a *HaLev Family Shabbat Dinner* this past May.

In addition to Jewish holidays, HaLev families enjoy programming throughout the year like *Blessing of the Babies; Mitzvah Fair; Consecration; Backyard Shabbatot; Heritage Judaica* and *Pedal for Your Honey* Adath bee honey extraction, *HaLev Bee Brunch*.

ECIFE

For the past year, Adath has continued to partner with Hopkins Early Childhood to provide both online and in-person family education to families with infants and toddlers. In addition, Adath clergy, staff and congregants provided Jewish parenting tips about a variety of pertinent topics. Over 25 families have participated, some for multiple sessions – making friends, building community and learning and having fun.

Milk and Cookies Storytime

Rabbi Weininger continues to read bedtime stories online each Thursday night for young children. Kids love to come on to hear the stories, chat with each other, show their bedtime snacks, and recite bedtime prayers. the Shema together before bedtime. During Rabbi Weininger's sabbatical this past winter, guest readers (and sometimes their dogs!) filled in with a wonderful array of favorite books.









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Ramah Family Camp

Prior to the pandemic, each August a cohort of Adath families join other families for Ramah Family Camp. Having been on hiatus for the past two years, Ramah is excited to welcome everyone back to camp to enjoy camp life and each other. Our cohort is excited to be together at Ramah this summer, to find meaning in nature and community; and to have FUN!

B'Yachad Sunday School

BYachad Sunday School for kindergarteners and first graders met in-person this past year after being online all last year. Supervised by Sue Leon Shrell, our long-term teachers Rachel Windthrop and Dayna Shad introduced students to the Aleph Bet and Hebrew words through interactive games and engaging lessons. Frequent visits from Rabbi Kravitz, Rabbi Weininger and Hazzan Dulkin provided an opportunity to study prayer and Torah as a B'Yachad community. Students also learned about Jewish holidays and customs in their classes and through "Beyond B'Yachad" family and parent education This year Beyond B'yachad programming coordinated by Sue Leon Shrell and Jen Robins emphasized interactive engaging activities learning about Challah, Tedakkah, Hanukkah, Pesach, and Lag B'Omer. Following each family program there was a parent only session with guest speakers while the students went back to class. Finally, we held the first annual "Bite of B'yachad" for families with children in pre-k and kindergarten who had never attended before. We hope this program helps bring even more kids to B'yachad next year.

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Secondary Education

The Secondary Education Committee oversees the activities of our children from 4th grade through high school graduation. Our responsibilities include Shabbat Morning Program (SMP), Junior Congregation, United Synagogue Youth (USY, KADIMA, and Maccabee Chapters), Heschel Society Teen Study, Moving Tradition Educational Program, and TEN@ADATH - Adath's religious program for high schoolers.

The Adath Jeshurun Youth Department provides an arena of programs for our youth to be involved within our community. Our programs allow these children and teens to engage, learn, lead, and socialize. We offer opportunities for them to experience Shabbat, prayers, Israel, social action projects, tikkun olam, and to create bonding friendships.

As activities are scheduled throughout the year, they have been planned and executed by the teen leaders. These skills (leading discussion groups, tutoring, supply purchasing, reaching out to maintain and retain peer members) are continuously improving and strengthening with each individual. Their positive energy and excitement has been contagious in encouraging others to actively be a part of our Adath Youth Chapter and Youth Department.

I am pleased to report these accomplishments under the leadership of Sue Shrell Leon, Adath Jeshurun's Director of Youth Engagement, Leonard and Clara Savitt Youth Director Chair:

SMP - Shabbat Morning Program

A successful continuation of our SMP with curriculum and tutorial enhancements. After a couple of years meeting weekly on zoom, our program return to in-person learning at Adath this year! Hazzan Dulkin, Risa Kessler, and SMP staff are continuing to develop new guidelines. In order to meet the needs of our students, a great focus on reading Hebrew was necessary to help our students overcome the learning loss from COVID times. The addition of these "reading clinics" are an example of the continued efforts (in partnership with Talmud Torah) to help our kids have a stronger reading foundation. The number of teen tutors (grades 8 (training to be tutors) and grades 9-12 (actively working with SMP students)), although less than previous years remained robust enough to carry the one on one studying with our students.

We said goodbye and THANK YOU to Mike Greenstein, our 6th grade Torah teacher, after his 37 years at SMP!

Junior Congregation

The 7th year of Junior Congregation (K-4th grade) was put on hold during the school year as the post-pandemic attendance was very low and/or non-existent. This program's structure will be evaluated for the next school year asking how to involve more families for Shabbat morning.

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TEN@Adath

Open to all community high school students, Adath's high school education program continues to run with much success! TEN@Adath (Teen Education Network), is Adath's weekly Tuesday educational class for our 9th-12th graders. Our clergy teach our teens. The teens gather for a 'schmooz' dinner before breaking into grade specific classes that meet for an hour of inspirational Judaic learning. Following this, all are available to continue their evening at our successful Tuesday weekly USY lounge. TEN@Adath is open to all community high school students.

10th grade Class: Confirmation - Getting Beyond your Jewish ABCs: Power and Responsibility in a Changing World - with Rabbi Weininger

Moving Traditions Program

Our Rosh Hodesh and Shevet groups continue to meet monthly based on interest level from each age group. We'll start two new groups next year for 8th graders. Each group moves through the grades together with their adult leader.

USY and Youth Programs

Many thanks to the devoted adult volunteers within the Youth Department led by our Youth Commission Co-Chairs, Lisa Aronauer and Jennifer Zacks. Our parent participation was extremely high with nearly 100% of our participating high schoolers' parents helping on committees and/or co-chairing our renewed fundraisers: Winter Activity Bags, Purim Carnival, Purim Raffle, Purim Mocktails, Purim Mishloach Manot and Hamentaschen Baking.

USY & KADIMA Chapter going strong with excellent programming related to Social Action, Israel, Social, and Holiday connections, returned in-person to the building after a couple years meeting virtually.

FROM THE YOUTH COMMISSION CO-CHAIRS:

USY was back in person for the 2021-2022 school year and it was exciting to be together again. We kicked off the year with our annual Kadima/USY barbecue and held in-person lounge nights every Tuesday. We had 23 Adath USYers attend Kinnus - the first in-person convention since January 2020. We also sent 13 to Winter Shabbaton which was rescheduled due to Omicron/ COVID. Our plans for Chapter Member Retreat turned into a successful Chapter Member overnight at the synagogue with 20 attendees playing whirleyball at the facility in Maple Grove and sleeping at the synagogue. CMR was closely followed by a very successful Purim carnival outside in the parking lot. Finishing out the regional events with Spring Kallah, 20 members registered and our USY chapter came home with awards for two of our programs - The Chocolate Seder and Friendsgiving - and one Adath member elected to regional board.

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COVID Related Set Backs for This Year

- No AIPAC this year for our teens
- The Maccabee program (grades 4th-6th) didn't run this year due to vaccine availability to this age group at the beginning of the school year. Once kids 12 years and younger were permitted to be vaccinated it was decided to hold off of on programming for this age because the vaccine participation wasn't as thorough as the older kids.
- Eighth grade participation was very low this year. This is the class of kids who all had virtual b'nai mitzvot. Their participation was very low across the board from Kadima to SMP to Talmud Torah.

Goodbye to Sue Shrell Leon

Sue, our beloved Director of Youth Engagement of 8 years, announced her retirement this winter. She generously gave plenty of notice so we could evaluate our program and make decisions to move into the future without her. Like everything else she does for the synagogue, Sue devoted many hours and much work in order to ensure a smooth transition at her departure. She will be greatly missed in this role! Thank you for your enthusiasm and dedication over the years, Sue!

Youth Education Strategic Planning Work

Sue's retirement announcement created a need for a youth education strategic planning committee which was chaired by Kim Gelperin and Jodi Rubin. This group kicked off a listening campaign by holding multiple zoom calls for adults and for teens. Small meetings and one-on-one conversations followed with Adath staff, parents, clergy, educators and anyone offering insight or ideas for the future of our kids' Jewish education. From the information gathered, the committee presented a short term and a long term education staff/program structure. Together with the clergy and larger strategic planning committee, it was decided to look for Jewish leader who has a proven track record working with teens and experience in a special education field in order to grow our youth participation back to pre-covid levels.

Hello to Rachel Sher

Rachel, our new Director of Youth Engagement, took on her new role the week of June 6th, 2022. Rachel's background includes positions as Director of Youth Programming and Engagement at other synagogues, directing summer camp education programs, and as Practitioner at autism day treatment programs and mental health centers.

Talmud Torah returned to in-person learning in fall 2021 while also offering online lessons for students who needed to participate via Zoom due to COVID. Being back in person ushered in a reinvigorated sense of connection and excitement for learning in all of our content areas, including Hebrew, Jewish Living, Tanach, Israel and Tefilah. Through her work she maintains a connection of the individuals with the congregation while providing them with community resources for support.

Meals: Offered to individuals and their families who need assistance while ill or after returning home from the hospital or nursing home. If you would like to volunteer to prepare a meal and deliver, please contact Kim Gedan or one of us. We will add you to our email list and reach out when a meal is needed.

Transportation: Volunteer drivers provide rides for Adath members who are unable to drive to Shabbat services. We have a great need for new volunteers as we endeavor to reinstate the program after the pandemic closure.

Caring Connection: Connects with congregants in various ways. For example, Gan Shelanu Preschool provides packages to seniors during the High Holidays. Additionally, homebound congregants are contacted by phone from a team of volunteers.

Bank and Bill Management: Help individuals organize their home finances and bill payments.

Healing Service: Arrange for a prayer service for those who are recovering from an illness that is conducted wherever requested by the individual being comforted.

Bereavement Comfort (Kol Nehama): Congregant volunteers send condolence notes and make follow up telephone calls to members who have suffered a death of a family member. At Rosh Hashanah we prepare and mail small packages offering condolence to those members who have had a death in their family to let them know that the congregation has kept them in mind as well as their loved one.

Minyan Calling: Calls are made to congregants who have an approaching yahrzeit to encourage their attendance at daily Minyan services.

Spiritual and Religious Outreach: Arrange for volunteers to conduct services at various nursing homes. We also sponsor occasional programs for the Sholom Community for Hanukkah, Purim and/or Passover.

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Congregational Nurse Program

of Yad Sima Tova

The Congregational Nurse Program grew out of Adath's Outreach Caring Community: Yad Sima Tova as a natural extension of its mission and purpose. The Congregational Nurse brings the medical, spiritual and social dimensions of healing to our congregants.

Elaine Savick is our Congregational Nurse and is a registered nurse with many years experience. Elaine is also a certified Honoring Choices Facilitator (for writing health care directives) and has completed the Foundations of Faith Community Nursing training. She has recently been trained to facilitate the Stepping On falls reduction program and presentations. The Nurse works closely with the clergy as an extension of their pastoral work enabling them to reach more members in a timely way.

The Congregational Nurse does not provide hands-on care, but she does:

- Assess needs
- Visit Adath members and families in their homes and other settings or maintain contact by phone to offer support and guidance when recovering from an illness or when facing health issues
- Update out of town family members as appropriate with permission
- Act as a health educator
- Provide guidance on health options and act as a health advocate
- Make referrals to JFCS and other community resources as appropriate
- Make referrals to Adath services and programs and to Adath clergy as appropriate
- Attend care conferences with family members
- Support congregants and their families who are in hospice care or dealing with serious illness or isolation
- Assist individuals with writing a health care directive
- Serve as a resource to Adath staff members regarding health issues within their families

More information may be found in the Congregational Nurse program brochure, available in Adath kiosks and on the Adath website in the "Resources" section. Marc and Julie Kozberg have been very generous in their support of the Congregational Nurse Program. Their participation along with that of other Adath Foundation funds in this valuable outreach activity is very much appreciated, and we extend our heartfelt thanks to them.

Hospitals and care facilities under present laws no longer release patient information to Adath. Elaine relies on the clergy, families and friends as well as direct contacts from the members themselves for her referrals. Everyone in the Adath Jeshurun Congregation needs to be a part of her work as a caring and compassionate community, keeping her in mind as we see individuals that may need her help. 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Archives

In 2002, The Jewish Historical Society of the Upper Midwest (JHSUM) founders, Nathan and Teresa Berman (of blessed memory) created an endowment for the JHSUM collection housed in the Anderson Library on the campus of the University of Minnesota. Over the past sixteen years your committee has collected 127 years of archival material documenting the 127 years of the history of the Adath Jeshurun Congregation. Together with the history of Bnai Emet congregation, we have amassed invaluable material of archival history that will be available to scholars and future generations to preserve our rich history dating back to 1884.

Over the years we have collected several additional boxes of historical material that were delivered to Kate Dietrick, our archivist. She has processed and integrated the papers into the files that have been digitized and are available for any one doing research concerning our congregation.

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Cemetery

Adath Jeshurun maintains two cemeteries, Adath Chesed Shel Emet Cemetery at 36th & Winnetka in New Hope and B'nai Emet Cemetery near 70th & Penn in Richfield. The mission of the Cemetery Committee is to ensure all members of the Jewish faith and their spouses and children have a dignified internment and an honorable place of rest in perpetuity.

A few highlights of our past year: A Kever Avot service led by our Adath Jeshurun clergy was held at the cemeteries during the High Holy Days. Private memorial prayers were provided by committee members if requested.

In 2022, the Memorial Day Program was held at the Adath Chesed Shel Emet Cemetery, featuring Joni Sussman, daughter of Holocaust survivors Ben & Hinda Kibort. Flags were placed on graves of Veterans and Shoah survivors with assistance from Scout Troop 738 chartered by the Sabes JCC. We invite all community members fo join us for this meaningful ceremony to recognize all veterans who were willing to make the ultimate sacrifice.

We continue to pursue plans to build a pavilion on the grounds of the Adath Chesed Shel Emet Cemetery. This project was put on hold temporarily due to recent supply chain issues and major cost increases; however we hope to start construction soon.

We hope to receive a Homeland Security Grant to add lighting and place cameras to help prevent vandalism and improve security at our New Hope cemetery.

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Chevra Kavod HaMet

Adath's nationally-recognized, award-winning Chevra Kavod Hamet (Society to Honor the Deceased) was founded over 45 years ago by congregants who wanted to help other congregants in a time of need. The Chevra has since become an integral part of the continuum of congregational life.

The all-volunteer Chevra provides comfort and support to bereaved families, while honoring the deceased by providing a traditional Jewish funeral for Adath members upon request. Chevra funerals are simple, dignified, and provided at a modest cost. Volunteers contribute their time and talents to administrative tasks, education, outreach, ritual participation, or support to bereaved families.

In the calendar year 2021, the Chevra served 13 families, about 54% of all congregant funerals. The families we serve consistently praise the Chevra for being present and for providing meaningful support and loving care, and attention to practical needs, at a time when they needed it the most.

The COVID-19 pandemic has caused changes to the work of the Chevra. For safety reasons, the Washburn-McReavy funeral home professional staff now performs a modified *tahara* (washing and purifying of a deceased body) instead of a full *tahara* by Chevra volunteers, and sitting *shmira* (watching over a dead body) has been suspended. With COVID vaccinations changing the landscape of pandemic seclusion, we anticipate returning slowly and thoughtfully to modified versions of *tahara* and *shmira* in the foreseeable future.

The Chevra continues to provide assistance with preplanning a Chevra funeral. Preplanning offers many emotional, spiritual and financial benefits and we encourage all congregants to consider this option. 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Hesed

Our mission is to coordinate and provide opportunities for acts of justice and loving-kindness within the our community. Over the past year, HESED continued to focus on issues of food insecurity, housing and racial justice. In addition, HESED embarked on an initiative which seeks to promote quality early childcare education in conjunction with affordable housing. Many congregants performed acts of HESED throughout the year offering financial support for the causes Adath supports.

Food insecurity: Due to COVID-19, HESED was unable to volunteer much in 2021. However, there were a couple of small volunteer groups that prepared and brought food to Our Savior's Shelter and the food was delivered to the rooms by their staff. With great appreciation to generous contributors here at Adath, HESED was able to donate to the organizations we support. On the High Holidays, HESED was able to provide food and supplies, and raise \$3973.00 for STEP, the ST. Louis Park Emergency Program. HESED continued to support three food shelves, Prism, ICA and STEP. HESED contributed funds to Our Savior's Shelter when not able to serve, and enabled meals to be provided to Loaves and Fishes when our volunteers couldn't be there.

Housing: HESED continued its longstanding support of MICAH, the Metropolitan Interfaith Council on Affordable Housing. MICAH is an interfaith council dedicated to affordable housing. HESED also continued to support JCA (Jewish Community Action) which promotes legislation to help prevent homelessness and make more affordable housing units available across the metro area.

Racial Justice: HESED continued to support the work of JRLC, (the Joint Religious Legislative Coalition) which promotes racial justice through legislative change and NACOEJ (the North American Conference on Ethiopian Jewry) which provides better lives for Ethiopian children & families in Israel.

Promote Quality Early Childcare/ Learning: HESED became one of the sponsors of the RISE Early Learning Center along with several other faith partners in our community. RISE Early Learning Center offers child care adjacent to affordable housing and provides a family centered approach to education and respect for cultural differences. RISE will serve the community by preparing children and families for school readiness in a safe environment that encourages exploration, active learning, and affirmation. Through superlative efforts of our new Gan director, Julie Ziessman and with the generous support from our Gan families and others, the Purim Pushke fundraiser was able to raise about \$1500 for this wonderful cause.

HESED hopes to resume volunteering and performing in-person mitzvot in 2022.

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Israel and Masorti

The Adath Israel Committee strives to enhance our connection to Israel and Masorti. The committee's goal is to promote a deeper engagement by our members with Israel and Israelis, and to create a connection to Jewish peoplehood through our relationship with Israelis and Israeli history. We organize educational opportunities for our Adath members and for the greater community on issues of interest and importance concerning Israel.

We support and build connections between Adath Jeshurun and Magen Avraham, our sister congregation in Omer, Israel, just outside Be'er Sheva. Rabbi Yosef Baruch Fromer, who leads Adath's sister congregation Magen Avraham in Omer, is a proud graduate of our rabbinical intern program. In May of this year, Rabbi Yos ran a program, "From Sorrow to Celebration," which was both fascinating and educational, reflecting on the meaning of the "transition ceremony," which marks the shift from Yom HaZikaron (Israel's Memorial Day) to Yom Ha'atzmaut (Israel's Independence Day, which follows the next day): from grief to celebration. This program was sponsored by Adath's Israel Committee, the Israel Center of the Minneapolis Jewish Federation and the Foundation for Masorti Judaism. The program was recorded on Zoom and is available in the Israel section of the Adath web site.

In March, Adath's Israel Committee and the New Israel Fund sponsored an evening, "Can We Talk About Israel?" in which our Rabbi Harold Kravitz and Daniel Sokatch, NIF CEO, explored our committed, complicated relationship with Israel with perspectives from Sokatch new book of the same name? The program was well attended by both Adath members and others in the community and took a hard look at some complex, controversial and sensitive topics. The program was recorded on Zoom and is available in the Israel section of the Adath web site.

The Minneapolis Jewish community is paired with the city of Rehovot as a part of the global Partnership2Gether (P2G) program and we have continued to stay connected virtually. Israel opened up to tourism in May of this year, and through P2G, there is a very exciting upcoming Global Experience program: a "delicious" culinary trip in October. With the guidance of our rabbis, the Keruv Committee is known for its thought-provoking discussions, as we delve into the more complicated issues that can arise within the life of our synagogue. The model we follow is to name the "issue", study relevant texts and engage in meaningful and thoughtful conversation to arrive at a conclusion or consensus. This year, we discussed inviting interfaith couples to be blessed prior to their marriage, which now has been adopted as an Adath Policy.

We continued work on our webpage, adathjeshurun.org/keruv, which now includes images, upcoming events and resources for both interfaith families and the LGBTQ+ community.

The committee also continued to work with J-Pride to support the LGBTQ+ community and will be participating in J-Pride Shabbat this year.

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Antiracism

Adath Antiracism Committee (AAC) was formed in June 2020 in response to the murder of George Floyd and the protests that followed as well as the unanimous support of our Board of Trustees to sign onto a national statement to say Black Lives Matter. It was initially formed as a sub-committee under Keruv but has been operating independently.

As a committee, we are working with our congregational family to initiate reflection and action to further our commitment to antiracist work, which includes racial diversity, understanding and inclusiveness. In How to Be an Antiracist, Ibram X. Kendi writes, "An antiracist idea is any idea that suggests the racial groups are equals in all their apparent differences—that there is nothing right or wrong with any racial group. Antiracist ideas argue that racist policies are the cause of racial inequities."

This year, we worked with the Security Committee, focusing on incorporating Diversity, Equity and Inclusion (DEI) into our security policies and procedures. This is a challenging but important issue that we will continue to work on next year.

We stepped outside of Adath to be part of a program led by Commissioner of Public Safety, John Harrington engaging with Interfaith Action, a group of faith leaders from across the state incorporating many denominations. We discussed scenarios of police interaction with the public before and after considering how the tenets of faith might alter our thoughts about how to respond to the situation. We did this first with members of Interfaith Action and then brought the process back to Adath. Commissioner Harrington has already worked on policy changes with the legislature based on the feedback of the involved groups and this will be continued next year.

Our Committee formed a relationship with Westwood Lutheran Church and School's Racial Justice Committee. We have been learning from each other's approach to antiracism, shared some tools, and discussed additional ways of working together. This will continue next year.

We met with an adult ally and student leader from the Minnetonka Coalition for Equitable Education (MCEE), learned about their efforts to bring equity to Minnetonka schools and agreed to maintain a supportive relationship with the organization. At our request, Adath sent a letter in support of MCEE to the School Board.

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MAZON Advocacy Project: Minnesota

For the past year, the Mazon Advocacy Project: Minnesota (MAP:MN) continued to function on a virtual basis. Action alerts were disseminated through a Facebook group and through the Adath Hesed Committee. The group supported priorities developed by the Partners to End Hunger Coalition.

For the 2021 legislative session, those priorities included funding for emergency food pantries (including STEP, PRISM, and ICA), funding for the Market Bucks program at Minnesota farmers markets, and new rules to prevent 'shaming' of students who are unable to pay their school lunch debts.

Looking to the future, Mazon has hired a new staff person to reinvigorate its synagogue organizing efforts. The expectation is that MAP:MN will eventually be replaced by a new system for supporting the organizations work to end hunger in Minnesota, the United States, and Israel. 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Women of Adath

Women of Adath celebrated 102 years of affiliation with Women's League for Conservative Judaism. Our history of being an integral part of the Adath Community goes back to before the Synagogue's Articles of Incorporation were signed.
